Jeffrey Thomas's career in authentic period performance has been international in scope. He has performed with the Smithsonian Chamber Players, the Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra of the West, Concert Royal, the Bach Ensemble, New York's Ensemble for Early Music, Boston's Banchetto Musicale, the Dallas Bach Society, and at the Festwoche der Alte Musik in Innsbruck, at the Opera Lirico Bologna, at the Spoleto Festival, and at the Library of Congress, Lincoln Center, and the Kennedy Center. He has sung nearly twenty roles with the San Francisco Opera, including leads in operas by Cavalli, Britten, and Mozart. He has recently recorded Bach's Cantatas 80 and 147, Bach's St. John Passion, and Haydn's Lord Nelson Mass.
